Every day in Illinois...

...more than 430 babies are born

31 will be reported to APORS*

Of these:

- 20 have birth defects
- 9 were born before 31 weeks gestation
- 2 will die without leaving the hospital
- 2 died before delivery
- 2 will have a serious infection
- 2 will spend more than three days on a ventilator

Five years (2011-2015) of APORS data were analyzed to determine the number of infants that meet each APORS case criterion (see Table 1). Because multiple adverse outcomes may coexist, it is possible for an infant to have been counted in more than one of the categories in Table 1. Infants diagnosed with a birth defect represented more than half the cases. Almost one third of the infants reported to APORS were born very early.
